
WAO SERVICES

The WAO refuge centre offers three basic services:-

- shelter
- telephone counselling
- face-to-face counselling

In 1991 there was a 23% increase in the telephone counselling service and a slight drop in the shelter and face-to-face services.

THE SHELTER

Refuge was provided for 74 women: 62 domestic violence and marital problem cases and 12 other crisis cases. The centre also housed 99 children.

Domestic Violence and Marital Problem Cases

Five of the marital/domestic violence cases were old cases. For one woman it was her fifth stay at the centre since 1989; each time she went back home to her husband.

The 62 women stayed for an average of one month (30 days) ranging from two days to 111 days.

Problems

The women who sought refuge faced layers of problems that were interrelated. A common problem was the physical and mental battering by their spouses/partners and sometimes their relatives (in-laws, parents).

Outcome

During their stay at the Centre, the women discuss their problems with our social workers, volunteers and other residents at the Centre. We only provide them with options and possible solutions. The final decision is theirs. Almost half the women (40.3%) went back to their husbands. This outcome does not necessarily indicate that they were going back to a violence-free family life. Most of the husbands do not encourage their wives to have contact with WAO, thus WAO cannot do follow-up work unless the ex-residents visit, call or return to seek refuge again.

Other Crisis Cases

There were 12 cases; 10 new ones and 2 old. These women sought shelter because of various crisis in their lives. Some of these women were unwed mothers and others destitute women with nowhere to go. Although these women are not our primary target group, we have provided shelter, food, counselling and assistance to these women in need.


Present employment: two students, 8 unemployed, one unskilled, one clerical; salary: 200—399—2.

Types of cases: Two of the cases were married, those whose husbands are in for jail. Three had been married before. One was a young girl who was gang raped; one was molested by landlord, four pregnant, and the others either destitute or using centre temporarily.

Seven returned to their families; two went to other homes (welfare), three found work and left.



THE TELEPHONE SERVICE

WAO has logged 1,857 calls for our telephone service in the year 1991. There is an ever increasing need for such a service, this year alone, there was a 23% increase in the number of calls to the shelter. This service provides counselling and advice to a wide spectrum of women in general. Daily prob-

lems, divorce procedures, wife battering etc. are encountered:-

Counselling/Advice/Enquiries

Calls received from battered women who are hesitant/unsure of their next course of action and also who just want to pour out their troubles.

** General Enquiries

A substantial number of calls also deals with enquiries on WAO service, reports on cases of battery, friends/relatives calling in on behalf of their friends/family members and referral to other social support services which includes lawyers/Kadis and counselling centers. There are also a number of harassment calls from spouses of residents/ex-residents and also goodwill calls from residents. Request for financial assistance, complaints of sexual problems, ill-treatment of foreign maids, information on destitute women and children, parents, having problems with their children, teenage stress, abortion and sexual harassment by employers also make up the related number of calls. A small percentage of general/miscellaneous calls not directly related to WAO is also received.

Visits/Interviews

Calls made in relation to visits by members of overseas women's organisations, both foreign and local social workers, students/companies/magazines/reporters wanting information and write-up of WAO's related objectives. Also includes visits by donors etc.

**** Employment

Includes job offers from companies/individuals and individuals seeking WAO's assistance in job seeking.


***** Volunteers

Callers extending their services and existing volunteers calling in for follow-ups/ further advice on matters related to WAO.
