


Case Identification & Client Intake Flowchart



3Y Comparison: Resident's Data (2017-2019)




- 40 residents (67.8%) were Malaysians
- 24 residents (40.7%) self-referred
- In 2019, 15 (25%) residents stayed less than
 a week. 12 (20%) stayed for more than
 3 months
- Spouses and partners still make up the vast majority of abusers (40 cases, 67%), on par with previous years
- Before coming to WAO, clients sought assistance from the following sources:
 - 33 (56%) from the police
 - 27 (45%) from their family
 - 10 (16%) from Welfare




3Y Comparison: Face-to-Face Consultation (FFC) Clients (2017-2019)




- 164 (88%) were Malaysians.
- 99 (54%) were in existing marriages, and
 118 (65%) were mothers with children
- 88 (48%) were employed
- 117 (64%) required active social work and intervention
- 135 (74%) of FFC clients contacted WAO via the hotline
- **DV** remains the most common case type by far, making up **61% (111)** of all FFC cases
- In terms of **client's needs**:
 - 17 (9%) needed help with police report
 - 13 (7%) with protection orders
 - 24 (13%) approached for legal assistance
 - 58 (32%) asked for shelter
 - Of these, 46 (25%) were admitted to the WAO shelter



WAO Hotline Impact Analysis (2019)



IMPACT OF CCC Services in 2019

• CCC capacities:


Residential: 10 + 1 CCP

Daycare: 12

- Regular correspondence between service providers and social worker/child care staff to ensure sessions are individually tailored for each child and to monitor child's progress.
- Daycare & residential CCC services for 17 children in 2019 - enabled mother to work whilst we ensured the child received education and was taken care of during the day, and enabled mothers to bond with their children on a daily basis.
- We also provided ad-hoc daycare services for 8 children and 6 mothers in 2019. This enabled their mothers to find jobs, and take steps to rebuild their lives, whilst ensuring their children are cared for.

- 12 children are still receiving CCC services.
- 3 children were reintegrated with their mothers.
- 2 children moved to another shelter upon leaving the CCC.







Total Number of Students in 2019






Total Number of Participants in 2019


